Came Down, 4-5 December




We return to Came Down on a bitterly cold and blustery day. This is a very exposed site high on the ridgeway overlooking the sea, but at least the sun is shining. Mary, Phyllis and Adrian set out to finish the section of wall that they began at the beginning of November...

... while Tim and I complete and cope the section next to the cheek end. The wall isn't very high and some of the copes, which are huge, seem somewhat out of keeping with the building stones. This isn't the most attractive wall that we've rebuilt but at least it's now standing upright rather than being slumped across the landscape.





And there's no shortage of hearting. Many of the old stones crumble at they are taken off the wall.







By the end of the weekend, a further section of wall has been taken down and foundations laid. And so, we say farewell to Came Down for this year but no doubt it will be even chillier when we return in January. Something to look forward to!

If you haven't been out with us for a while and need a bit of practice, Came Down is the ideal starter wall – no more than eight courses, a single lift and on site parking. You'll have no trouble getting a mortgage on this wall!

Winter's Lane, 10 December

A sunny Friday morning at this retaining wall, minus anyone from the NHS Mental Health team who have only been out three times since we prepared this site in October. Rather disappointing. Sally, Tim and I have built most of the wall and it is looking very nice. When I arrived early this morning, a small family group of Sika deer were running across the field, trailing their long shadows. The field did look magical in the early winter sunlight. Unfortunately, the effect was somewhat spoiled by the sound of Portesham recyling centre echoing across the landscape.





Until Covid struck I used to be involved in the annual Purbeck deer census carried out by the National Trust in late October. My patrol area is Langton West Wood, Wilkswood and the Wildnerness. We start at 7 am when the woodland is dark and usually misty. Even if you can't always spot a deer (they are always watching you though), you can identify a Sika stag by its piercing

whistle (listen here: https://newforestguide.uk/biodiversity/new-forest-deer/sika-deer/), and a hind by its high-pitched scream. We usually 'hunt' for deer in pairs but if you are on your own, the sounds can be eerily spooky.

But back to Winter's Lane! Sally and Tim attend to the back of the wall as well as the front.
Fortunately, there is an abundance of large filler stone and a sack full of earth.

The photograph below shows the wall at the end of the day. We won't be walling here until after the New Year. It might be difficult to hold back completing this section of wall if the NHS group stays away but there is always another section to prepare.
